Cold Weather Emergencies





November 2025 Safety Minute







Introduction

- Outdoor winter activities bring unique safety risks
- There are two major conditions that leaders must prepare for all outdoor winter activities
 - Frostbite
 - Hypothermia
- You will have Scouts at risk for and possibly showing these conditions
 - Leaders must identify symptoms and be able to provide cold weather first aid
 - Proper equipment and training will mitigate risks and allow Scouts to enjoy the outdoors









Frostbite

- An injury caused by freezing of the skin and underlying tissues
 - Liquids within cell walls freeze
- Early stage of frostbite is called frostnip
 - A cold feeling followed by numbness
- As frostbite gets worse, affected skin may change color and become hard or waxy-looking
- Most common on fingers, toes, ears, cheeks, chin and tip of the nose
- Can be caused by direct contact with ice, freezing metals or very cold liquids









Symptoms

- Numbness
- Tingling
- Patches of skin in shades of red, white, blue, gray, purple or brown
 - The color of affected skin depends on how serious the frostbite is and the usual skin color
- Cold, hard, waxy-looking skin
- Clumsiness due to joint stiffness
- Pain
- Blistering after rewarming









Hypothermia

- Abnormally low body temperature that is dangerous, and potentially fatal if not properly cared for
- Hypothermia most often occurs when individuals are exposed to extremely cold temperatures for extended periods of time
- Can also occur in warmer environments
 - Wearing wet clothing in windy conditions
 - Becoming chilled from being in the rain for an extended period
 - Submersion in cold water
- You will have Scouts with hypothermia!









General Information

- Hypothermia occurs when the body loses heat faster than it can be generated
- Once body temperature begins to drop, the heart, brain, and other organs start losing the ability to function properly.
- To prevent hypothermia, be aware of your environment and dress accordingly.
 - Cover all exposed skin surface possible to help prevent heat loss
 - Avoid activities and clothing that will cause you to sweat a lot
 - The combination of wet clothing and cold temperatures will cause more heat loss
 - Wear multiple layers and stay dry









Signs/Symptoms

- Feeling cold, shivering uncontrollably
- Cool or cold skin on the abdomen, chest, or back
- Presence of the "umbles"
 - Stumbles: loss of control over movement
 - Mumbles: slurred or incoherent speech
 - Fumbles: poor coordination or reaction time
 - Grumbles: change in behavior or attitude









Unit <u>Renewal</u> Tiiiiimmmmmeeee

- Tool opened on Nov 3rd; Council goal is to complete by <u>Dec 15th</u>
- Asking each unit to appoint a "Renewal Champion" and send name to <u>dbalmer8@comcast.net</u>. If no name received, defaults to Committee Chair as the Champion
 - Champion must be a Key 3 or Key 3 Delegate to be able to access the necessary online tools
 - Champions will receive periodic email updates on the progress of recharter council-wide. When their unit charter is "posted' they stop receiving the updates!
- Key challenges (& solutions) for Renewal Champion:
 - Not enough youth (need at least 5 youth OR recruitment plan and waiver signed by DE and Scout Executive)
 - Adult registrations expiring (renew! Those expiring 12/31 can renew <u>NOW</u>)
 - SYT expired/expiring (check out forecast on SYT Pie-Chart for unit in Training Manager, get folks to take SYT)
 - Leadership role missing (have COR move folks OR register new adults)
- Best way to find issues? Be proactive! Have Champion log into my.scouting <u>NOW</u>, select Organization Manager, click on Unit Renewal (see next slide)
 - Go ahead, do it now... we'll wait.
 - Or, check out *Unit-Processing-a-Unit-Renewal-Oct-2025.pdf* which will be sent out with the Roundtable Notes


